The answer is, yes they did. But that was the way the king wanted it. And the shipbuilders didn't feel like arguing.

As a project it had everything you could want.

Vision? To be the biggest and the best. Venture capital? No problem. Cash flow? Unlimited credit

facilities. Human resources? The finest on the labor market. Management? Now that's where vision got in the way.

Like the ship, management was top heavy.

The message of the Wasa is all about three things: balance, awareness and listening. Personally I'm glad we all learned that three hundred and fifty years ago.

The famous historian AJP Taylor once said "the lesson of history is that nobody learns from history".

Well, my answer is this – they didn't have Executive Education around that's why!

I'd like to round off with the immortal words of film mogul Samuel Goldwyn when he gave his opinion of a particular film script – "None of this is any good except the ending!"

Yes, as you may have heard the new Financial Times ranking of executive education services has

now moved SSE Executive Education up to ninth in Europe and nineteenth in the world.
